To promote the planned and sustainable management of the O'Connell/Andromache, Proserpine and Gregory river catchments in a constructive and balanced way by actions such as promoting ecologically sustainable development, developing catchment management strategies, involving the community in NRM decision making, and promoting of the value of a coordinated catchment-wide approach for managing natural resources.

Whitsunday Catchment Landcare Inc. is:

- An Incorporated and Registered Environmental Organisation
- Registered with Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) and is afforded Tax Deductible Gift recipient status from the Australian Taxation Office. WCL reports annually to the ACNC and the QLD Office of Fair Trading.
- A Not-for-profit Community based organisation that has been operating in the Whitsunday region since 1998.
- In 2018– 2019 WCL had 60 members and over 38 registered volunteers and 248 people receive our monthly newsletter.
- WCL has a Management Committee of 7 members, which include community, local council and industry representatives.
- WCL also has a Public Fund that is administered by a Public Fund Committee of 5 members, acting independently of the WCL Management Committee

WCL is a member of the Central Qld Coast Landcare Network, a partnership for the natural resource management of catchments in the Central Qld Coast bioregion: Pioneer, Sarina and Whitsunday Catchments.

Coordinators Report

The 2018-19 financial year has been a busy one for Whitsunday Catchment Landcare (WCL). I would like to express my heartfelt appreciation to the WCL staff for their dedication and professionalism in undertaking their roles within this organisation. I would also like to thank the WCL Management Committee for their support and confidence in the WCL staff.

To WCL's continued benefit, Peter Alden our Landcare Officer was with us throughout the year. Peter's qualifications and extensive experience has enabled WCL to undertake a variety of projects and contracts that model best practice revegetation and impact upon the perennial issue of weed control in the local area.

Our Nursery and Volunteer Coordinator, Kath Bennett decided to retire in July 2018 after commencing with WCL in mid 2013. Kath provided a welcoming and interesting program at the community nursery as well as producing high quality native tube stock for use in revegetation projects, contract work and for sale to the general public. So thank you Kath for all of your efforts and for coming back as a volunteer at the Community nursery in between trips away. Nicole Murphy commenced in the Nursery Coordinator role in January 2019 with dedication, enthusiasm & rapid skill acquisition. Nicole has quickly filled the shoes that Kath left behind. WCL's Admin Officer, Leigh Donkers continues to provide her wealth of experience, dedication & enthusiasm while undertaking her administrative role with efficiency, accuracy, a great sense of humour— all that I could ask for in an administrator— even the Auditor said we run a pretty tight ship. I would also like to thank our Casual Staff, Chris Barbeler, Wayne Oakley & Craig McCredie for all the hard work they do on our contract work.

WCL continues to receive the substantial support of Reef Catchments (RC) and we are grateful for their ongoing provision of the office space and IT support. Reef Catchments Staff continue to work in collaboration with WCL, which has seen some great environmental outcomes for the local area. WCL has been able to provide RC with contract services for revegetation, weed and pest control projects. All of the money received from contracts & grants contributes to the ongoing employment of WCL staff and the undertaking of community/volunteer based activities and events.

WCL continues to receive generous support from Whitsunday Regional Council (WRC). WRC provides WCL with the Community Nursery site— electricity, irrigation water for our tube stock, revegetation sites and free mulch from the waste transfer stations. The WRC staff continue to provide support and assistance where they are able to and I would like to express our sincere appreciation for all their efforts.

I would also like to thank Cane Growers & Sugar Services Proserpine & National Parks for the generous provision of their boardroom/meeting room for our General meetings, at no charge.

Most importantly, a whole hearted thankyou is offered our 60 members and all of our generous Volunteers. This year WCL had 38 registered & active volunteers who either attend our regular community nursery mornings,

community plantings, seed collecting expeditions or site visits. **From July 2018 up to June 2019 WCL recorded a total 3,546 volunteer hours. These hours are divided between the nursery (2,588 hours), off-site volunteer activities (656 hours), public events (182 hours) & schools events (40 hours) which have been donated by WCL's generous and committed volunteers. The total dollar value of this equates to \$88,650.00 for this financial year.**

A extra special thank you to those two volunteers, who prefer to remain nameless, for their ongoing commitment to revegetation maintenance works at the Galbraith Creek Riparian project, the nursery benches & Community nursery site. A very special thank you to Alison & Steve Pearson for their fabulous contributions to our monthly newsletter. They have certainly raised the calibre of the newsletter content. And much gratitude to Leigh & Kara Donkers for keeping our Instagram & Facebook page up-to-date.

In the 2018-19 Financial Year, WCL continued to work in partnership with the Central Queensland Landcare Network (CQLN) improving the website and on contract works. Thank you to Sarina Landcare & Pioneer Landcare.

The Galbraith Creek Riparian Vegetation Project has been a long term commitment for WCL. Commencing in 2008, it is now complete (apart from ongoing maintenance & infill plantings). On the previous page, I have inserted comparative aerial photos -2008 & 2019 - of the Galbraith park site – a significant change can be seen. Congratulations to all who have contributed. Plans are in place to establish the next site for another 10 year project. Another Peri – urban Land management grant was received from the National Landcare Program– Small Environment grants program. This has allowed WCL to engage with 25 local landholders to have land management plans prepared for their properties. A QLD Gambling & Community Benefit grant & Dept. Social Services Volunteers grant, were successful and these provided for new tools & equipment, a trailer & materials at the nursery.

Our Community Nursery continues to be a significant contributor to our organisation through plant sales to the local community, agency revegetation projects & Whitsunday Regional Council projects. Donations of plants for National Tree Day to local schools & Plant Swap events at the Cannonvale Library have continued this year. Proserpine State High School Students & Reef Guardian Future Leaders program visited the nursery site as well. WCL continues to offer a range of fee for service Land Management Advice & Weed Control Services & Equipment hire to local landholders, as well as undertaking weed control & revegetation maintenance contracts for Reef Catchments & other agencies. I continue to apply for grants but there is always a lot of competing applications & we explore every opportunity to increase our funding sources.

I have summarised the range of projects that WCL has either managed or been involved with, in the table on the following page. Thank you again to all of WCL supporters for their generosity, hard work and dedication to Whitsunday Catchment Landcare.

WCL had 38 registered volunteers in 2018–19, who attend our regular community nursery mornings, community plantings, seed collecting or site visits. All new Volunteers are inducted in workplace health and safety, nursery practices and safe engagement when going "bush". Twice weekly volunteer events are held at the WCL Community Nursery and these are very well attended with many regulars. Activities at the nursery include: propagating of endemic plants, processing seed, recording propagation methods and results, nursery site maintenance, social interaction, great morning teas. We have endeavored to go "off site" once per month with alternative activities such as seed collecting and site visits to Landcare friends or volunteers properties, but this is constrained by our staffing capacity. Our volunteers have also staffed the nursery opening on the first Saturday of every month.

- In the last 6 years WCL has undertaken contract work for local organisations such as Reef Catchments, North Queensland Dry Tropics and Whitsunday Regional Council (WRC). This contract work has enabled WCL to earn small profits, which has in turn, been spent on activities untied to external grant obligations, such as our volunteer, school and community engagement activities. Contract works in 2018-19 have included: Weed control- Gregory River Riparian corridor; Riparian Revegetation Planting & maintenance— St. Helens Creek— 3 separate sites, O'Connell River— 1 site; Revegetation Projects- Whitsunday Paradise— Littoral Rainforest restoration; Prickly Pear Biological Weed Control - Conway Beach. Native Tube stock supply- DNRAA— St. Helens & O'Connell River riparian revegetation, Waite Creek Riparian project; many local landholders.
- WCL has hired out its Quikspray trailer, provided land management advice and undertaken weed control on a fee for service basis to private landholders.

Publications: Monthly Newsletter, Social media pages and Website. WCL produces a monthly newsletter that we distribute to our members and many other interested people or organisations. **A special thank you goes to Steve & Alison Pearson for their terrific contributions to our newsletter— these interesting articles about & photographs of the local fauna & flora, has certainly improved the calibre of our newsletter.**

Five General Meetings with guest speakers were held during the year— Steve Pearson- The Pie Eyed Currawong—big birds need big bird baths; Charlie Morgan Healthy Rivers to Reef update; Graham Armstrong— Bird-Life on the Bogie; Peter Alden— Managing Weeds in a Tropical Climate; and Graham Armstrong— Central QLD Landcare Network Website Fauna Data base. Ross Perry QLD National Parks & Wildlife— Fire Management in the Conway National Park presented at the last AGM. Six Management Committee meetings were held on alternate months to the General meetings.

INDEPENDENT AUDIT REPORT

To: The Members
Whitsunday Catchment Landcare Inc

Scope

We have audited the financial report of the Whitsunday Catchment Landcare Inc for the year ended 30 June 2019 as set out on the attached pages. The committee is responsible for the financial report. We have conducted an independent audit of the financial report in order to express an opinion on it to the members.

Our audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards to provide reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free of material misstatement. Our procedures included examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and other disclosures in the financial report, and the evaluation of accounting policies and significant accounting estimates. These procedures have been undertaken to form an opinion whether, in all material respects, the financial report is presented fairly in accordance with Accounting Standards, other mandatory professional reporting requirements, and the Associations Incorporation Act, so as to present a view, which is consistent with our understanding of Whitsunday Catchment Landcare Inc financial position, the results of its operations and its cash flows.

The audit opinion expressed in this report has been formed on the above basis.

Qualification

Part of the income derived by the body is of a nature that full control of receipts cannot be maintained until amounts are actually recorded through the body's books. As there are no practical audit procedures to quantify the effect of this, we are unable to express an opinion on receipts prior to their being recorded.

Qualified Audit Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects on the financial report of the matter referred to in the qualification paragraph, the financial report presents fairly in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards, other mandatory professional reporting requirements and The Associations Incorporation Act, the financial position of Whitsunday Catchment Landcare Inc as at 30 June 2019 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended.
