






# What is NAIDOC Week? 4TH TO 11 JULY, 2021

### Landcare Australia: Building Resilience in Local Communities the wellbeing benefits of participating in Landcare

Landcare volunteers avoid \$57million in healthcare costs due to boost in mental and physical wellbeing.

For decades, those involved in Landcare have testified to a greater sense of self, both physically and mentally, resulting from an enhanced link with their local community and environment. This, in turn, has boosted community wellbeing and it has long been the desire of the Landcare movement to quantify the significance of these benefits.

Now, newly published findings by KPMG Australia in partnership with Landcare Australia, indicate Landcare volunteers enjoy substantial improvements to their mental and physical wellbeing – and a significant decrease to their healthcare costs. 46% of survey respondents reported an improvement in their mental resilience and 90% reported experiencing a stronger connection to the community.

Surveying more than 1,000 Landcare volunteers and coordinators from Landcare groups, the findings in the report, titled Building resilience in local communities: The wellbeing benefits of participating in Landcare suggest substantial improvements in wellbeing owing to involvement in Landcare lead to approximate savings from avoided healthcare costs of \$403 per individual per year. For the Landcare movement which exceeds 140,000 individuals, that number equates to \$57 million nationally.

The report also goes on to address additional savings to the Landcare volunteer community relating to productivity, and benefits owing to natural disaster resilience and recovery, with the combined value amounting to \$191 million annually.

Seven of our dedicated volunteers attended the planting event at Jess & Alistair's place on the 20th May where we planted 265 new tube stock. Jess & Alistair (and their parents) had prepared the site and we managed to get most of the plants in the ground before the rain arrived. This is the second time WCL volunteers have helped with the revegetation planting at the site.

At the rear cane mulched area in the photo below, you can see the results of the August 2020 planting event, now reaching the 2m mark. This demonstrates how quickly the results of revegetation can be achieved—with good site preparation, regular water through the first dry season and keeping on top of weed infestation, the plants respond beautifully.

Thank you to Jess & Alistair for purchasing their plants from the WCL Nursery and for the lovely morning tea on the veranda, watching the rain fall helping the new plants settle in. Volunteering time is rewarding when we get to directly participate in a landholders journey to rehabilitate their land to improve habitat values and increase biodiversity.

# What maybe Showing

Common name:

Mackay Cedar, Red Siris

Scientific name:

Falcataria (syn. Paraserianthes) toona

Family: Mimosaceae

**Description:** Bushy spreading tree to 20-30m tall with a trunk to 1m diameter. Deciduous in September/October.

Occurs in Rainforests & scrubs from Cape York to Mackay. Bark Greyish Photos: C. Peterson

brown, smooth when young aging to rough & scaly on mature trees. Branchlets have numerous lenticels and new growth is covered in brown hairs. Needs well drained soils & prefers a sunny position. Red & yellow streaked timber is highly prized for

furniture, turnery & joinery & flooring. Food species for the Tailed Emperor butterfly

Bipinnate leaves to 30cm long with 10-22 Leaves: secondary segments each with up to 70 pairs of small, narrow-oblong leaflets, with a gland between many pairs, leaflets opposite.

# Flowers: Flowers have five petals cream to greenish, staminal filaments about 5 mm long & held on terminal panicles 10-15cm long. Flowering usually in spring but trees have been observed to be flowering now. Heavy flowering does not occur every year (so its pretty exciting when they do)

**Fruit:** Pods flat dehiscing along both sutures, 9-16 cm long and up to 3 cm wide with 4-6 seeds.

**Propagation:** Propagate from scarified seed. **WCL is keen to obtain seed for propagation.**

One Hundred & one Trees of Mackay – SCAP Mackay Branch

### **Pest Hall of Fame**

Common Name: African Tulip

Botanical Name: Spathodea campanulata subsp. nilotica African tulip tree is a restricted invasive plant under the Biosecurity Act 2014. It must not be given away, sold, or released into the environment without a permit. The Act requires everyone to take all reasonable and practical steps to minimise the risks associated with invasive plants and animals under their control. This is called a general biosecurity obligation (GBO).

**Origin:** Native to tropical West Africa, the African Tulip was introduced to Australia as an ornamental tree used in both gardens and as street trees. Popular because of the large bright orange flowers and dark green leaves the African Tulip has quickly spread and established itself as an environmental weed. It is listed on Global Invasive Species Database "Top 100 World's Worst Invaders".



**Description:** Fast growing, the African Tulip can reach heights of 25m with spreading buttresses when mature.

Leaves: Compound leaves are opposite 15-350mm long with 3-13 unequal sides ovate, hairy leaflets 40-110 x 25-800mm with visible venation. The leaves form a dense dark canopy are bronze in colour when young but deep glossy green when mature.

**Flowers:** Large orange bell-shaped with 5 fused petals with yellow frilly edges 90-120mm long and borne in terminal clusters. Flowers mostly in spring but can occur all year round.

**Seeds:** emerge from clusters of hairy buds to show their bright orange colour. The seed pods are woody and poisonous. Spread by wind & garden waste or by birds dropping uneaten seeds.

**Problem:** African Tulip will readily escape gardens and will reproduce from seed or suckers. It is highly recommended that it be removed from areas near waterways and

native vegetation. Have a look when you drive around our catchment and see how many you see in creeks, gullies and bushland. African tulip trees a public safety hazard (when these

trees are planted along footpaths, their dropped flowers can create a slippery walking surface) African tulip Trees are extremely harmful to native stingless bees as the pollen is toxic to them.

**Management:** Seedlings and young plants can be pulled out by hand however larger specimens need to be cut down or stem injected with herbicide. Due to their ability to sucker, plants that are cut down will need to have their stumps treated with herbicide (cut stump) to ensure regrowth does not occur. If using the cut stump method, cut the trunk as close to the ground as possible, preferably not more than 10cm away from the ground and paint with herbicide as soon as possible. Treat any suckers with herbicide.

### Guidelines for seed collecting:

- Only collect seed from your own property or with written permission
- Source plants must have grown from seed from the Whitsunday Region
- Collect ripe, mature seed & no more than 10% of the seed from any one plant
- Collect from several parts of the plant, mainly the middle & upper branches
- Use paper bags (not plastic ) to store the seed & keep them in a cool place
- Label the bag with the species, location, date and your name. Not sure of your plant identification? Include a stem with some leaves & /or take a photo.

You can drop seed off at the nursery on Tuesday or Thursday mornings, or at Reef Catchments Office 30 Main St Proserpine, or call 0483 811 229.


